



# 4) ITEMS FOR THE INFORMATION OF THE BOARD

# **4.1 Superintendent's Report:** Superintendent, Steve Martinelli's packet included:

#### CURRENT

#### State Metrics

The numbers continue to trend in the wrong direction. This week's numbers are 393.5/100,000 case rate and a test positivity rate of 11.4%. Each of these numbers are in the extreme range and are trending upward. This has been the basis for our decision to extend our two week pause through the rest of December.

When the new metrics were introduced, 50% of the counties in Oregon would have been able to provide K-3 in-person instruction. By time the metrics were put in place and became the new model, 20% of Oregon counties were able to provide K-3 in-person instruction. The data has increased in the following way. The week of:

- 10/12: 222 cases per day in Oregon
- 11/30: 1314 cases per day in Oregon
- December over 2000/day in Oregon with 110/day ending up severe with hospitalization
- 10/11-17: 71 cases in Linn County for the week
- 11/22-11/29: 161 cases in Linn County for the week

- First week of December 271 cases in Linn County
- Zip Code 97374: 51 total cases reported all time, 13 in the past week

These numbers tell us we are no longer in our own little protected pocket. Let's make sure we continue to follow our protocols when in the buildings. We can all do our part to mitigate the spread of COVID.

This data has confirmed the decision to follow the Governor's two week pause for in-person instruction. We have extended this pause through the remainder of December for most in-person instruction.

#### School Risk

The Oregon Department of Education and The Oregon Health Authority have generated a one page document titled, "Research Informing Changes in K-12 Metrics Framework Released in October."

This document provides several source documents identifying what's being learned about the limited transmission of COVID -19 in schools when guidance and protocols like the Ready Schools, Safe Learners are closely followed. They also included information as to why zip codes are not being used as opposed to counties for the metrics.

# 4.3 School Reports

# 4.3.1 Centennial Elementary School Enrollment - 281

#### **EDUCATION HIGHLIGHTS**

- Kindergarten is currently in distance learning. Teachers have sent surveys to parents to get input about how to best meet student needs and create a smooth transition for families until we can offer an in-person option again.
- We have been looking at the first round of i-Ready test results and teachers are using the results from the reading and math portions to inform instruction. The second round will start in January and we will examine growth and adjust instructional methods.
- Centennial's CDL team has finished updating our school's Operational Blueprint. New safety guidelines and a hybrid plan for in-person instruction are on Centennial's website and the district website. Staff received training on the updated plan last week.
- Jennifer Kelson, Lauren Biamont, and Rheanna McDaniel have been working on getting friendship groups started. We want students to continue to connect and support each other during this time. They are hoping to have at least one or two small groups for each grade level. Student participation has been based on student need and interest. This team is continuing to support and reach out to our students as they navigate CDL.

#### **COMMUNITY HIGHLIGHTS**

Holiday Parties: Parent volunteers are currently collaborating with teachers to
provide students with holiday crafts, learning activities, and treats. Each classroom is
doing it a bit differently, but our students will still have a great deal of fun celebrating
together!

- Parent Club: Parent club successfully hosted an online auction. This auction utilized the items and baskets that were donated last Spring. Baskets were distributed to auction winners last week.
- **KPI Grant:** Kaitlyn Brockamp, Nicole Schumacher, and Jennifer James have collaborated to start Centennial's Little Hawks Virtual Preschool. Currently 20 preschool students are signed up. Learning backpacks with early learning activities are scheduled to go home next week.

# 4.3.2 Scio Middle School Enrollment - 141

## **Athletic Update**

 On December 7, 2020, the OSAA voted unanimously to push back the start of high school sports to February. This does not bode well for middle school sports. The 12/9/2020 Tri-River Junior Conference athletic director meeting has been rescheduled for after winter break. We are hoping to have new information to help guide our decisions regarding middle school sports.

## **Education Update**

- With the current global situation, the current state of education is looking very different. Here is what is happening at Scio Middle School.
  - \*For Limited In-Person Instruction (LIPI), we have been bringing in 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> grade science students that would like extra science instruction. The participating students have really enjoyed being in the building. It was great to see them in-person!
  - \*Teachers are using Google Classroom, Google Meets, videotaped lessons, email, phone calls, and Google Hangouts to share lessons and connect with students.
  - \*We will continue to have staff meetings every other week and sped meetings monthly.
  - \*Students will take 4 classes at a time every 6 weeks. This will help them stay focused because navigating 4 on-line classes is easier than 7. We are currently in the third six weeks which started on 12/7/2020 and will end on 1/28/2021. We have also completed the first nine-weeks grading period.
  - \*Students will rotate some classes each 6 weeks, such as PE, social studies, science, music, health, agriculture, typing, etc., but will have math and language arts every six weeks.

#### • Student Recognition:

 With the end of the first quarter brought 1<sup>st</sup> Quarter Honor Roll. We are proud of the 28 students that earned a spot on the Scio Middle School Honor Roll, which means they earned a 3.5 GPA or better.

#### **Building Update**

• Clothing drive: We have wrapped up the Scio Middle School clothing drive. We had several families take advantage of the donated clothes (somewhere brand new with tags on!).

# **Professional Development:**

 Those that participated in AVID Digital XP have another free opportunity to extend their learning. Each participant can choose the subject of their choice and spend 2 evenings from Feb until April learning.

#### CDL Update:

- The end of the Fall term (the first 12 weeks) was Friday, December 11. Students are 1/3rd of the way through the school year. Winter term A started on December 14.
- Limited in-person instruction was put on a pause for two weeks to honor the governor's orders for the rest of Linn County. We have started bringing in small groups once again.
- Social-Emotional Learning is more important than ever. This time of year is tough in a normal year then add the pandemic on top of it is bringing more students forward with anxiety, depression, headaches, and lack of ambition. Mrs. Yeager sent out a wellness survey and is connecting students with support.
- Staff is working hard to connect and reach out to students who are struggling academically. Many teachers have now added study time, one-on-ones, and extra coaching time to work with struggling students.
- Broadcast Media has our video announcements up and running now.
- Scio Student Council is working with the Scio Fire Department for our annual food drive this year. Given the current circumstances, the food drive will look a little different, but the goal will remain the same. The Student Council would like to challenge our high schoolers to fill the bed of a pickup truck with food. The drop-off location will be active every Thursday (December 3rd, 10th, and 17th) from 2:30-4:30 p.m. at the Baptist Church. Students collecting donations will be wearing masks and gloves to ensure safety measures. When you are dropping off your food, please inform the drop-off location of your grade/students' grade to be counted for spirit points.
