4) ITEMS FOR THE INFORMATION OF THE BOARD

4.1 Superintendent's Report: Superintendent, Steve Martinelli's packet included:

CURRENT

- **2021-2022 School Year Plan**

What is in the draft guidance document? (Remember it is draft and likely to change slightly, however it most likely wouldn't have made the draft document if there wasn't serious consideration for it, so probably only slight changes will occur from this info to the first final document.)

- All schools will be open for full-time, in-person instruction 5 days a week (school schedules will be posted when fully developed).
- Additional resources will be provided for mental health support, school safety and prevention, and crisis services
- Any remote instruction virtually must be 50% synchronously delivered and by a licensed teacher, but we will not be required to have any virtual programming. Again we plan to not provide CDL except for individual circumstances and special cases. If a family is still interested in pursuing virtual instruction they might wish to consider planning for another option in the Fall.
- Oregon will align to CDC guidance with some increase in local decision making in regards to health and safety requirements in the school.
- Physical distancing of 3 feet will be recommended when possible but not required at all times.
- Face coverings will likely be required in schools due to the number of unvaccinated students and the fact that students 11 and under do not have a vaccination available to them. There is some indication that vaccination percentage in the state, counties, or regions might play into some of these decisions.
- Isolation & Quarantine plans will still be required to be in place when a case of COVID-19 is present in a building.
- Transportation, Entry & Screening, Cleaning & Disinfecting, Cohorting, Visitors & Volunteers, etc. will likely be allowed to be determined by local decision making

As always, this information is "as of today." Another topic discussed was the vaccination proof issue. New guidance was shared last week from the Governor's office which said that once the state reaches 70% vaccination rates then there will no longer be a requirement to show any proof of vaccination and face coverings will be an option for all. However, this is not going to be the case in schools. Because we will have high populations of unvaccinated students in school, we will likely have face covering requirements until our county reaches a certain level of vaccination. We shall see.

4.2 GT Report: Director of Charter Schools, Gary Tempel packet included:

Facilities: The permit is awaiting our pick up at city hall. We are having a meeting with Emerick Tuesday to determine if they can do the project based on lead time for supplies and availability of contractors.

Projects: The insulation on the kitchen addition will be done on Thursday, sheet rock is scheduled to start the last week of school. Electrical is scheduled for the first week of July. I have one bid for siding on the HS along the driveway so it will match the upper half of the music room. I am doing a scope walk with one of the fob contractor's next week, then the HS fob project should be good to go. I am also getting bids for backstops and a set of dugouts for Bates Field.

4.3 School Reports

4.3.1 Centennial Elementary School Enrollment – 280

COMMUNITY / EDUCATION HIGHLIGHTS

- Kindergarten Zoom Orientations and the delivery of welcome learning backpacks will be delivered soon. This will be coordinated with our virtual Little Hawks Preschool Program. That program currently serves 28 students and has been funded through our KPI grant (Kindergarten Partnership Innovation Grant).
- Mrs. Brockamp just finished a virtual yearbook and a virtual talent show for our students. These can be accessed through Google Classroom.
- Our school paper-bound yearbooks and school pictures were just sent home.
- Kindergarten graduation was a success and our fifth grade celebration is tomorrow.
- We had two field days of fun with games, competitions, a parachute station, a petting zoo station, and a tie dye station, where students created brightly colored t-shirts. We are excited to have parent volunteer support again next year!

GRANTS / PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

- Our Staff is participating in a “**Design your own change**” project with a grant through the Western Regional Educator Our change has been given \$15,000 of support this year and another \$15,000 to support the project through next school year. Currently we are using funds from this grant to train our instructional assistants in RULER and to support staff development opportunities. We are planning a retreat that will take place August 16th-18th. Over 90% of all of our staff will be attending and this is completely funded by the grant. During the retreat we will plan for next year, do professional development, and work on school and district initiatives. We want a strong start to our year.
- **Mid-Valley STEM-CTE Hub Grant Awards:** We had eleven teachers receive grants ranging from \$300-\$900 each. K/1 teachers plan to use this grant to buy supplies for a “maker” station, where supplies will be shared between grade levels. Grades 2-5 are using their funds to purchase materials that will enrich current science units in the areas of engineering and design.
- **KPI:** Our school was awarded additional funds for early learning and to implement a Kindergarten Jumpstart program. We were awarded \$4000 towards supplies and an additional \$8000 that can be utilized this August.

4.3.2 Scio Middle School Enrollment – 148

Athletic Update

- **Fall Sports:**
 - Sign-ups have started for cross-country, football, and volleyball.
 - Cross-country and volleyball coaches have hired, but we are still looking for football coaches.

Education Update

- **Student Handbook:**
 - Changes to the Student Handbook for 2021-2022 school year around leggings/tights.
- **Field Trip:**
 - The 8th graders took a field trip to Silver Falls State Park on June 15th.
- **8th Grade Promotion:**
 - The promotion event to honor our 8th grade students before they head to high school is June 17th under the covered play shed at SMS.
- **SBAC:**
 - We have completed testing this year. We have not seen any results yet.
- **Hybrid instruction is underway.**
 - Students are taking four classes at a time. They recently completed the 5th six-weeks rotation and have one to go.
 - Teachers are utilizing Google Classroom, Google Meets, videotaped lessons, email, phone calls, and Google Hangouts in addition to in-person provide lessons and connect with students.
 - Students that chose to continue CDL, which is the on-line learning, will be able to, because teachers are teaching simultaneously to students in CDL and in-person.

Building Update

- **Summer Construction:**
 - Teachers have been purging and boxing up supplies in preparation for this summer's seismic construction project.
- **Student Displays:**
 - Students in Ms. Hardin-Utley's, Mrs. Kuykendall's, and Ms. Muhr's art classes have been displaying their artwork in the hallways.
 - Students running for class office have creative campaign posters displayed for the upcoming election.

Staff Update

Mr. Nolan presented to the Board the rewrite of the Middle School Dress Policy.

Current Dress Policy

Student's attire should be modest and appropriate for school. Students are expected to avoid wearing clothing that is sexually provocative. Any clothing that supports or glamorizes alcohol, drugs or tobacco including any gang related clothing is strictly prohibited.

Tops will not expose the mid-drift, be too tight or revealing, or expose undergarments. Tank tops or tops that expose the shoulders, large areas of the back, or large areas of the chest may not be worn to school. Pajamas are not acceptable, nor excessively baggy or sagging attire. Tennis shoes must be worn and laced appropriately for PE. Hats, caps and sunglasses may be worn to school but not in the building. Clothing or accessories that could cause harm or distractions such as sunglasses, chains, rivets, or spikes are not acceptable. Leggings and tights will not be worn without shorts or skirts. Shorts and skirts will follow the fingertip rule, even if worn with tights or leggings. While individuality is encouraged, students must consider the suitability of their clothing choices. Backpacks, bags, and coats will be left in the student's locker.

Violation of this Dress Code may result in the student being given alternative apparel or sent home to change into acceptable clothing. Staff members are expected to address dress code violations in the halls and classrooms. In all cases, when disagreement arises concerning interpretation of a rule, the administration reserves the right to make the final decision.

Proposed Dress Policy

Kerri Hyde commented that our graduation is the same night as Regis. Is there some way to talk to the other school around us to make sure we are not all having graduation on the same night.


