6.1 Superintendent's Report

- **1. PACE Day:** Pace Day was on April 10th. Presentations focused on cyber security, employment termination, liability determination, the complaint process / policies, leave law, and school emergency management.
- **2. Santiam Service Integration Conference:** Was held at Centennial Elementary on April 11th. This conference featured presentations from the Scio School District and non-profit organizations in Linn County and surrounding areas. SSI facilitates the connection between families and community providers, ensuring that individuals and families have access to the resources and services they need. Christina Hoeckle, our district family resource coordinator, and Kimberly Dwyer from Santiam Health helped with the facilitation of the conference.
- **3. Small Schools Association 2025 Conference:** This was held on April 17th and 18th and did provide opportunities to connect, learn, and innovate with other small districts. Emphasis on the future of education, current trends, and access to resources and programs were a focus.

Tracy Porter, Business Manager, proposed to the Board a new committed fund. Which is the Curriculum and Technology Fund. The purpose of the Curriculum and Technology Fund is to provide a dedicated and sustainable source of funding for curriculum- and instruction related expenditures, including technology and textbook purchases.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, Scio School District—like many districts across the country—invested in 1-to-1 technology devices for students. Our technology team has worked diligently to extend the lifespan of student-issued Chromebooks; however, these devices will inevitably reach the end of their useful life. To proactively manage this, we are proposing the creation of a committed fund specifically for technology replacements. In addition, we are developing a staggered replacement cycle to avoid the financial burden of replacing all student devices at once.

We are also proposing to set aside funds for curriculum needs. While textbooks follow a seven-year adoption cycle, costs vary significantly depending on the subject area (e.g., Health versus Language Arts). Although we budget annually for curriculum updates, these funds often go unspent in years without major adoptions. By establishing a committed curriculum fund, we can incrementally allocate resources toward future adoptions—allowing us to free up funds and reinvest back into the classroom.

Audience member asked if the technology that the teachers use will be included in this Curriculum and Technology fund. Tracy said that they are working on it but it is all in the same fund.
