4.1 Spotlight on Education: Michelle LeFeber, Centennial Elementary School present to the Board the following on Summer Literacy Program that was held this past summer and was a great success.

Scio School District's Summer Literacy Program Report

Program Purpose

The 3-week Summer Literacy Program provided targeted, evidence-based literacy instruction to students completing grades 1–4. Academic goals included growth in foundational literacy skills for younger students and growth in comprehension and writing for older students. The program was offered to all students, not just those identified as academically at-risk, creating a more positive and motivated learning environment.



Program Structure

- Duration: 3 weeks, 6 hours/day (≈90 hours per student)
- Students Served: 43 total (Gr. 1: 10, Gr. 2: 16, Gr. 3: 10, Gr. 4: 7)
- Staffing: 3 licensed teachers, 3 instructional assistants (ratio 7.5:1)
- Curriculum: Literacy Footprints, aligned with the science of reading



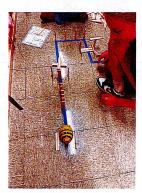


Instructional Approach

Instruction included guided reading, explicit phonics instruction, modeled/shared reading and writing, oral language development, fluency practice, and daily writing connected to reading. A community partnership with the Scio Public Library provided weekly literacy enrichment activities.

Outcomes

- 72% of students completing grades 1–3 showed measurable growth in at least two skill areas.
- Average gains: +18 percentage points in decoding accuracy and +15 words per minute in fluency.
- Students demonstrated stronger comprehension and writing skills.

Areas for Growth

Attendance was a limiting factor, particularly for older students. While younger students attended consistently and showed strong gains, older students were less consistent, reducing measurable growth overall. We are considering how our program can be better used to serve those students that attend more regularly or how we can increase attendance for these older students who have need.

Key Takeaways

The Summer Literacy Program succeeded in meeting its academic goals and accelerating literacy growth. Offering the program to all students created a more positive environment and stronger engagement. The Oregon Department of Education has begun talks about funding the program again next summer, and we are hopeful our district will continue to receive support to sustain and expand this opportunity. We know our students have been positively impacted by this.

5.2 Microschool Solutions:

Rachelle Noble, Founder of Microschool Solutions, presented to the board the following: Rachelle started Microschool Solutions in February 2023. She runs the business and also has 15 students she teaches out of her home.

Philosophy and Mission

Our school reimagines public education by creating a network of small, community campuses that provide personalized, hands-on learning in supportive environments. The charter school ensures rigorous compliance with Oregon standards through licensed teachers of record, who oversee curriculum, assessment, and student progress across sites. Microschool leaders, operating under independent contracts, bring unique strengths and community engagement to the learning process, while the charter provides accountability, oversight, and equitable access for all students.

Facilities and Physical Location

The charter school's official administrative address will be [insert]. Instruction will take place across multiple approved microschool sites located in homes or community spaces. Each site will be reviewed and approved through a standardized process that includes:

- · Verification of occupancy and safety requirements;
- Background checks for adults present;
- Health and safety compliance checklist aligned with state and district expectations.
 This process ensures that all learning environments are safe, healthy, and conducive to learning.

Staffing Plan

The charter will employ licensed teachers of record (meeting the requirement that at least 50% of staff are licensed) who will oversee a ratio of approximately 1:100–150 students. These teachers will:

- Provide curriculum planning and approval;
- Monitor student progress through regular assessments, including BOY, MOY, and EOY benchmarks through iReady.
- · Report grades and performance to families and the district;
- Ensure compliance with IEPs, 504s, TAG, and ELL supports.

Microschool leaders will not be employees of the charter but will operate as independent contractors under Memorandums of Understanding (MOUs). They will manage daily instruction

Questions from the Board:

Board member asked how much this will increase our workload. Kim said it will increase but there are advantages to both sides. Rachelle said they will take as much of the load of reporting and the student systems as they can. Board member asked what is the main difference between an online school and the Microschool? Rachelle said that it is an in-person school. These schools happen in churches, and people's homes. Board members asked what the ratio of teacher to student is? What about the safety of the students? Rachelle said they do

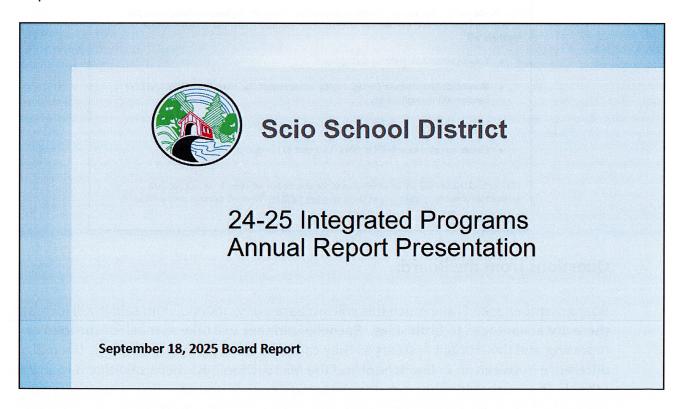
background checks on the staff and inspections of the building they are wanting to use for their schools. Online audience members asked how do you interact with religious community that want to do independent education? Rachelle said that we would want to make sure we are in line with the law. Churches have space during the week that are not being used to help us with a location. Audience member asked if Rachelle would be open to half the day being regular education and the other have been religious instruction? Rachelle said it depends on what the law says about public education funding and religious instruction. Audience member asked what the money part is, the bottom line? Kim said we haven't gotten to that point yet. We are just seeing whether we are interested or not to move forward with additional talks. Audience member asked if their teachers are certified? Rachelle said some of the teachers are certified and some aren't certified. The teachers that are not certified they have an oversite of certified teachers.

Rachelle would really like to make a partnership with Scio School District. Kim and the Board thanked Rachelle for talking about her Microschool and Kim will reach out soon.

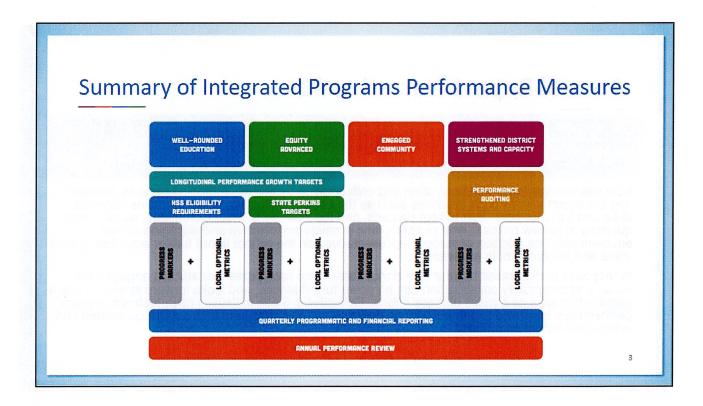

Scio has strengthened communication and collaboration by actively engaging parents, students, and the community through initiatives such as the Logger Collective, which identifies essential skills and traits for post–high school success, and the Positive Climate Committee, which meets quarterly to review policies, ensure safety, and promote an inclusive and engaging school environment. The addition of student representatives on the school board further amplifies student voice and involvement in governance.

In response to decreased regular attendance rates, Scio recognizes that student engagement, voice, and community collaboration can be powerful influences, and looks forward to seeing future gains in this area as a result of these efforts. Collectively, these initiatives have fostered stronger partnerships, improved alignment with postsecondary readiness, and built a more connected and responsive school community.

Annual Report Narrative #2

Where have you experienced barriers, challenges, or impediments to progress toward your Outcomes and Strategies in your plan that you could use support with?

During the 2024–25 school year, a leadership transition and the redistribution of responsibilities created challenges within the elementary reading program. Despite these circumstances, overall English Language Arts proficiency increased by 2%, with more students meeting state grade-level expectations. However, third grade did not meet its ambitious target.

To address these challenges, the district is leveraging the Summer School Grant and Early Literacy Grant to strengthen MTSS systems and structures. Moving forward, a Literacy Leadership Team will focus on implementing protocols and evidence-based strategies grounded in the science of reading. Efforts will also emphasize expanded assessment and progress monitoring, alongside comprehensive professional development for all staff.

Annual Report Narrative #3

The 9th grade on-track-to-graduate rate exceeded the LPG target by 6%, driven by a stronger focus on course scheduling, counselor oversight, and the continued support of the High School Success Coordinator.

While the on-time graduation rate remained steady, the five-year completion rate increased by 3% and surpassed the LPG target significantly. Moving forward, the district will continue to expand partnerships with Santiam Service Integration, the ESD-provided family support liaison, and other outside supports, while strengthening its counseling and behavior support teams under the guidance of the district-level behavior consultant. In addition, efforts will continue to prioritize student, parent, and community engagement to support ongoing success.

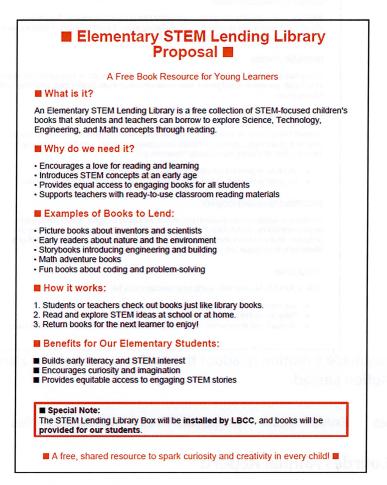

RefReps

RefReps is designed to integrate seamlessly into an elective course. It provides structured lessons, assessments, and engaging video-based learning. Students earn credit while gaining practical, real-world skills.

Hands-On Training

Using real game film, students practice making officiating calls in simulated situations. This builds confidence, judgment, and communication skills before they ever step onto a field or court.

Meeting Oregon's Needs

Oregon faces a critical shortage of certified officials. RefReps connects Scio students directly to the Oregon Athletic Officials Association (OAOA), creating a pathway for them to start officiating immediately. Students can:

- Work as registered officials for extra income in high school or college.
- · Support youth and middle school sports with well-trained student officials.

Nationally Recognized Program

RefReps is endorsed across multiple states, including Oregon, and comes highly recommended by OSAA Assistant Executive Director Kris Welch. By adopting this program, Scio positions itself as a leader in innovative sports education and aligns students with national officiating standards.

Cost & Value

With a 10% OSAA discount, each seat license costs \$45. Licenses:

- · Are required for each sport studied.
- . Take 5-6 weeks per sport to complete.
- . Remain with the student indefinitely, updating annually with new NFHS rules

CPI Training & Follow-Up

- o Facilitated CPI training session on August 27th (12 staff) and scheduled training for October 10th (13 staff tentatively scheduled).
- Conducted ongoing staff check-ins for integrity of CPI implementation and to address student- and incident-specific questions.

• Trauma-Informed & Bus Driver Support

- o Delivered a Trauma-Informed Bus Driver Training (8/25/25).
- Developed and distributed Trauma-Informed Bus Driver Lanyard Cards for quick reference.
- Collaborated with bus drivers to create PBIS Bus Posters, aligning with building-wide PBIS systems and mirroring elementary PBIS posters.
- Scheduled monthly professional development sessions to expand on trauma-informed care, bus-specific needs, and CPI for transportation staff.

- Aligning staff recognition with student PBIS systems to create a cohesive, district-wide culture of positive behavior support. (currently at the elementary school)

Art: On October 4th, Scio Family Cares Day, Mrs. Hickey's art class will be there with a face painting booth.

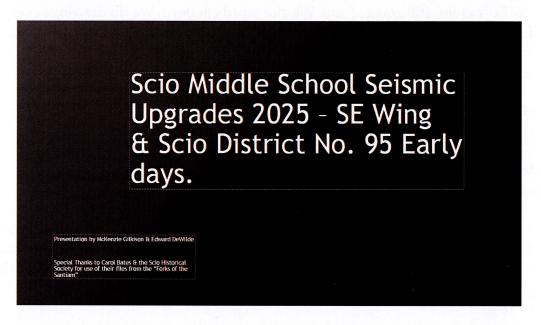
McKenzie Gilkison:

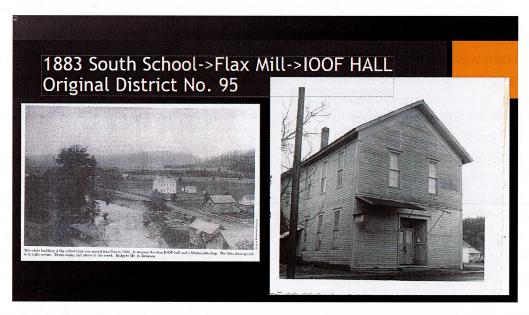

And here's the original Southside of school and Scio District #95 and the Southside of school was moved into town and it was turned into a flax mill and then the Odd Fellows Hall was upstairs, and then eventually a chicken factory and was torn down in 1978.



1895 Scio school, and it was not the first school in style, but it was the most documented, and it stood over 100 feet tall and was the pride of Scio and Scio school district 95 paid a \$1,000 for a lot 118 or yeah, lot 118, which is now the bates field and in attendance there was 16 boys and 40 girls, and the colors were tan with dark brown trim.

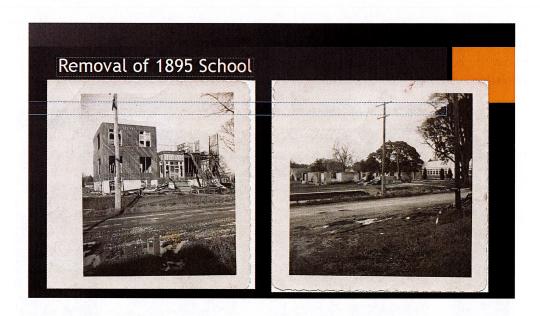


And then, in 1939, this was the Scio high school and since 1952 is the Scio Middle School, and you can see the Northeast and Southeast Wings had not been yet constructed, and they paid \$10 for four different Lots,

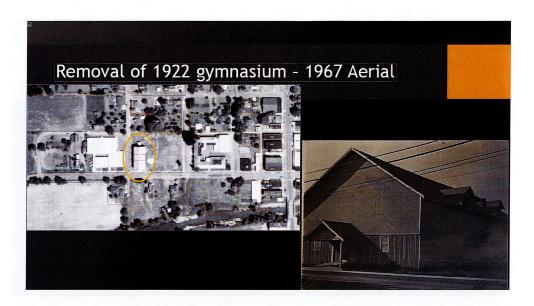
and they were able to build the high school for \$20,727 after five months, and they paid \$150 for a lot 66, which is the old district office, and they had to move City Hall one block east.



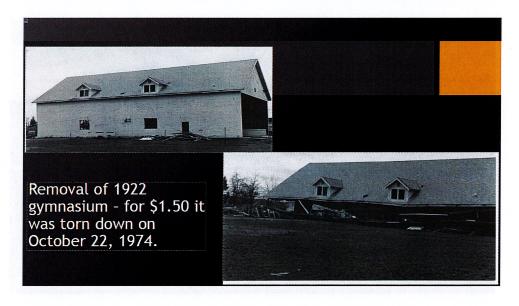
And then the 1895 school was eventually removed. Henry Cosman bid \$300 to remove the 1895 school and to reserve the old school bell and the high school already being constructed. You can see it to the East and then in the left photo. You can see Scio first school bus.

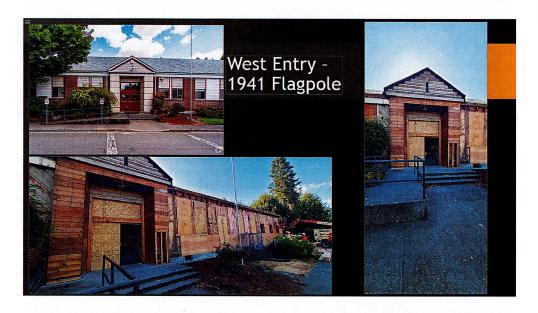


Here's a view of the 1895 school, the Northeast, across Northwest First Avenue.

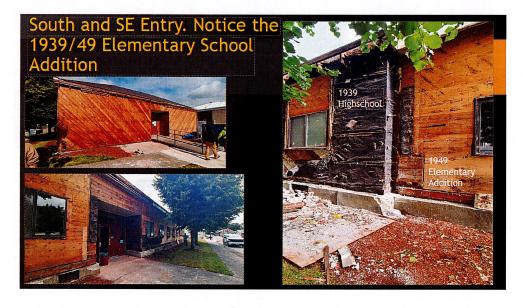


And then the removal. This is the 1922 gym, and then the 1967 Ariel of it. Scio's first gym was built in 1922, the upper floor was the gym, and the lower floor was the locker rooms, and then the gym was eventually removed. It was last. Documented use was in 1975, and the gym was not visible in 1978, and it was torn down for \$1.50.





And then, here you can see the West entry of the middle school and the 1941 flagpole was actually donated by Percy Shrunk after Pearl Harbor, and this has been the entry for Middle School from 1950 to 2024.



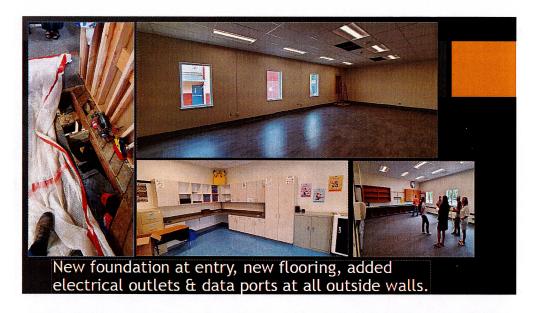
And then here is the southeast wing of the Middle School. And in 1998, style rented the Hudson building for \$5.00 a month for more classroom space for first graders. In the first and fourth graders attended here.



Today, the seismic Grant paid for removal of glass blocks into exterior siding, installing to your walls, insulation, new windows, electrical outlets, new communication data, ports, and flooring.



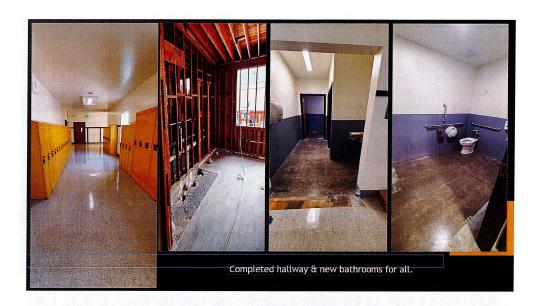
And then, here you can see the original flooring in the 1939 Library and the original blue tile from around 1949.



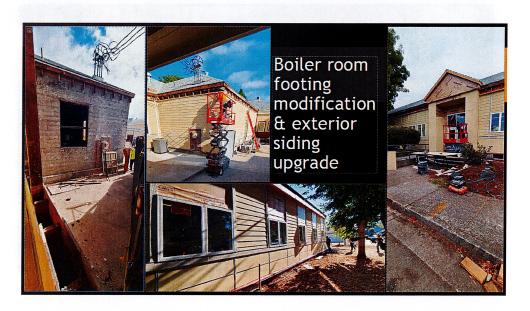
New foundation at entry, new flooring, added electrical outlets and the data boards at all outside walls.

And then the boiler room footing modification and exterior siding upgrade.



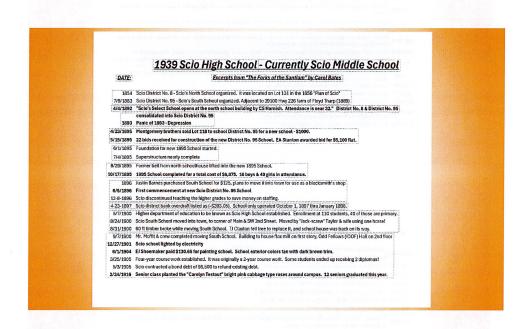
And here's a view of the painted exterior and then the flagpole from 1941.

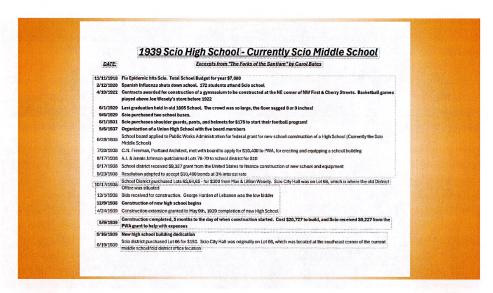


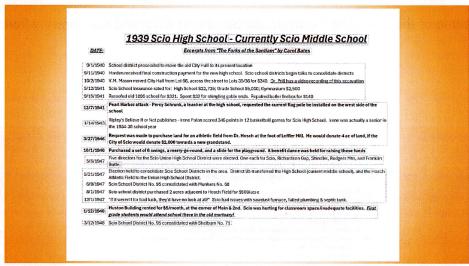

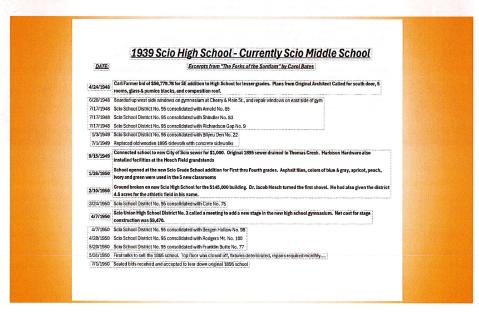


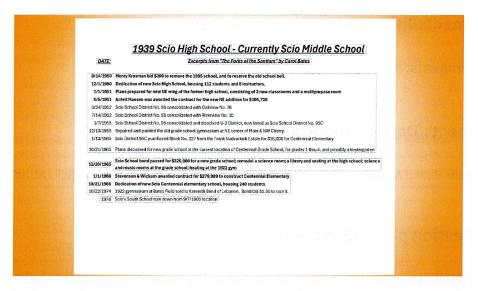
And then this is some of the new classrooms, in the Southeast wing and the library where it originally was.

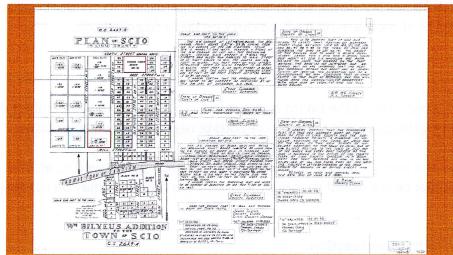
